ERASMUS+

Deutsche Gehörlosen-Jugend (Germany YNAD) submitted its application for Erasmus+ in October. The whole 10-week delay has finally come to an end. We are very relieved and had been very worried. Now many deafblind participants can look forward to receiving a grant for the camp, which will support both the travel costs and the DBA. The price for participation has been adjusted and the reimbursement of travel costs will be taken into account depending on the distance. We can exchange all further details by e-mail.



PARTICIPANTS

Deafblind people from all over Europe can take part in an EDBY camp in Germany. Regardless of Erasmus+, all participants from Europe are welcome. On the next page we have formulated clear conditions that participants must fulfill for the camp. Communication will be mainly in tactile sign language using International Sign. Interpreters for spoken and sign language will be provided based on the information provided at registration. Interpreting into your own language must be organized by yourself.



Participants

Each country can register 2 participants and another 4 participants can be put on the waiting list. All participants must be between 18 and 35 years old, have both a hearing and a visual impairment and attend the camp continuously from July 21 to 31. By arrangement, older participants up to 38 or 40 years of age may also attend.

Skills

We recommend that participants have the skills to contribute to the workshops and group activities and that they can continue to be active in the future. The basic requirement for communication is that they have a basic knowledge of English.

Disadvantage

Please consider and support participants facing disadvantages, including women, those with BIPoC, queer, or disability. We prioritize diversity.

DEAFBLIND ASSISTANCE

Each participant can be accompanied by one deafblind assistant (DBA). The DBAs must have experience in dealing with the world of deafblind people and have the appropriate qualifications in their respective country. They must be registered on a form by 15th May 2024.

The costs for all deafblind assistant cannot be covered by Erasmus+ and must be paid out of your own pocket. However, your participation and transportation costs will be covered by us. If a participant needs two DBAs or financial support, please contact us and we will find a solution.

REGISTRATIONS

Registration is already open. Participants can only be selected by recognized national organizations. The registration link for participants will be sent to the national organizations in a separate e-mail. The list of organizations can be found here in the link. There are three different forms with links: one for participants, one for the waiting list and one for DBAs. The registration deadline is 15th May, 2024, after which registration will be closed and the waiting list process will begin. If you need more time to register, please let us know as soon as possible.

PS: The e-mail exchange for participants and DBAs takes place via a special e-mail address. You will only find out the special e-mail address once you have registered the form. You can use it to ask questions and receive feedback.

PROGRAM

The program of the camp can be found in a separate document. It is a general program and the schedule has been developed specifically for deafblind people, which we are used to from other non-deafblind events. The program includes various workshops and exchange opportunities that are valuable for everyone. You can read about what is behind the individual program in general on the following page.

Arriving (Day 1)

Get ready for the start of an exciting camp! Checkin, gather information, and join a guided tour to explore the camp surroundings. It's the first day, and you have free time to discover more about the camp environment.

Introduction & Ice breaking (Day 2)

Meet fellow deafblind youths from different countries. Learn about each other, share where you're from, and participate in a fun ice-breaking game during the opening ceremony led by the organizing team.

Communication & Protactile (Day 3)

Understand Protactile, a unique way of communication for deafblind individuals. Explore how it differs from tactile signing and discover how some deafblinds use Protactile to communicate effectively.

Culture & Deafblindhood (Day 4)

Delve into the meaning of being deafblind and explore the identity of the deafblind community. Discuss cultural aspects, challenge stereotypes, and understand the importance of existence and experiences.

Mental health & Experiences (Day 5)

Share your personal experiences as a deafblind individual, addressing challenges and emotions. Reflect on accepting and managing life burdens, focusing on the past experiences.

Silence day & excursion (Day 6)

Take a peaceful day to process and reflect on what you've learned during the camp. Engage in self-awareness and peaceful thinking, emphasizing the present moment.

Future & Dreaming (Day 7)

Explore the future of the deafblind community and envision yourself in the years to come. Discuss empowerment, mental health, activism, dreams, and breaking taboos surrounding sexuality.

Body health & sexual health (Day 8)

Embrace new experiences and activities related to physical health, sports, and art, imagining a vibrant and active future.

Activism & Rights (Day 9)

Learn about the rights of the deafblind community and discuss steps to reclaim your life and assert your rights. Explore the knowledge acquired and consider how to use it for activism and advocacy.

Feedback & Gala (Day 10)

Reflect on personal growth and changes throughout the week. Participate in discussions, watch media team presentations, vote for the next host country, and provide feedback during the closing ceremony.

Departure (Day 11)

Check out and head home with lasting memories from an enrich camp experience.

Self care (Daily)

Participate in daily morning exercises to promote physical and mental health. Embrace self care practices that nourish the mind and body, setting a positive tone for the day ahead.

Evening activity (Daily)

Enjoy engaging and entertaining events during the evening, designed to foster a sense of community and relaxation. These activities could include cultural presentations, country-themed evenings, or other enjoyable events to create lasting memories and strengthen bonds among camp participants.

TRANSPORT

On 21st July, 2024, participants and their DBA can travel to Düsseldorf Airport by plane, long-distance bus, or train. From there, a shuttle will take them to the camp. The exact time and meeting point will be provided to registered individuals. Transportation costs may be covered for participating countries through Erasmus+ funding. Details on maximum

reimbursement will be shared in separate messages, or you can contact us for specific inquiries.
